#### INTRODUCTION...

If you've been watching our Deuteronomy series, you've hopefully discovered what a wonderful and inspired book Deuteronomy is. You'll probably also have worked out that a short series cannot possibly do justice to a 34-chapter masterpiece like Deuteronomy – so we hope you'll be wanting to explore more!

By far the best way to explore any Biblical book is to read the Bible text itself, praying that God would speak to you and meet you through his Holy Spirit as you do. Even if you don't understand everything, we think you'll still find your spirit singing and soaring closer to God as you do – that's certainly our experience.

Alongside doing that though, using materials and content produced by other people who've studied different parts of the Bible in more depth can be really helpful too – if we didn't think that, we wouldn't bother making our films!

We have produced some supplementary resources ourselves, exploring the authorship and date of Deuteronomy and some of the harder questions not addressed in the series. Below are a selection of other materials that we have used and loved that will help you explore more in Deuteronomy.
